Meet Luke

"It changed everything.
I think I'm more confident than I was before."

This year Possability's Pathways to Employment services delivered customised employment to jobseekers with disability in Tasmania, and laid the foundations for its delivery across all states in 2024. Luke worked alongside a Possability Career Coach, Beatrice, to explore his interests and find employment opportunities.

"Beatrice reminds me of the teachers that actually cared enough to stay by my side and help me out," Luke says. "They get to know me and what I'm good at. I tell them what I want to do in the future, or things I'm really good at, and they just find the things that help me."

After securing a work experience position at the Hotel Grand Chancellor, Luke continued to work with his Career Coach and was offered a full-time job. "I think I'm more confident than I was before."






We continued to work with the Living with Disability Research Centre at La Trobe University to embed Active Support in our services. We're establishing Practice Leaders state-by-state, who are responsible for coaching their teams in Active Support and quality of life.

Wellbeing and health are supported through annual health checks, specialised mental health services and access to health services in regional places. As well as access to Allied Health for people we support in regional areas through Therapy Connect.

We partnered with Enliven's National Community Cooperative pilot project, a new support model that empowers people with disability to create cooperatives in shared living and have more control over their lives.



We have a newly formed Human Rights and Voice team that's dedicated to engaging directly with the people we support with disability to understand if our services are meeting their expectations and needs.

Our community support services continue to head on a trajectory of capacity building. Programs are chosen based on interests and future plans, like learning how to catch a bus and sell crafts at the local market.

Our Support Coordination services have grown organically through direct referral in Adelaide, Sydney, Melbourne and in regional and far north NSW.









Innovation has a crucial role in addressing individual needs and enhancing the lives of people with disability.

Through our Pathways to Employment customised employment services, we partnered with 75 jobseekers with disability to understand their strengths and interests, and supported them to thrive in their workplaces.

We're progressing in the NDIS Home and Living Demonstration Project with our Enhanced Support Services, designed to simplify NDIS services for people with complex support needs and empower managing relationships.

Our Virtual Reality pilot program is a fun and safe way to build skills, confidence and connect with others. Twelve people signed up to trial experiences linked to their NDIS plan goals and interests.

We shared knowledge to contribute to a better Australia for the people we support.

Our partners at the Applied Research Centre for Disability and Wellbeing completed the second stage of research for their Scale of Severity project. They hope the tool will be used across the sector to provide evidence for behaviour support strategies that better uphold human rights.

We made two NDIS Review submissions: one outlining how people with moderate to profound intellectual disability have been underrepresented in NDIS decision-making and the other discussing that the NDIS does not support planning for capacity building or employment pathways in its current form.

We awaited the final reports from the Disability Royal Commission and NDIS Review, anticipating opportunities for real and positive change in the years ahead.



Our 3900-strong team of talented, passionate and dedicated employees live our purpose every day.

We hosted 25 employee Listening Forums across Australia, helping to shape our shared beliefs.

Our Child and Family Commitment.

This year we cared for 375 children and young people, their families and communities.

We're developing a new Practice Framework that will strengthen how we work and ensure all children and young people receive a high level of professional care. They should all have opportunities to grow, learn and develop through their time with us.

The framework will be underpinned by our Values and Commitment, and informed by the CALM therapeutic model, Therapeutic Crisis Intervention and Positive Behaviour Support principles.

We're committed to measuring up against ten Foundational Elements of Care, which are based on rights, safety and the things young people say they need to feel safe, supported and to thrive. Elements include connection to culture, having a voice, knowing their rights and developing through education or work.

As an organisation focused on human rights, , we have reaffirmed our commitment to collaborating with First Nations kin, community and carers, and partnering with Aboriginal Community-Controlled Organisations. We appointed a Director of First Nations Cultural Governance and Leadership to lead this important work.

Caring for more young people in more places.

We were one of 16 Out-of-Home Care service providers commissioned by the WA government to deliver Temporary Care, Group Foster Care and Community Foster Care across the state, as they work to reform their child protection system.

Our footprint in SA has more than doubled, taking us from caring for young people in four houses to 11 homes. We're proud to be able to provide more young people with safe and nurturing care in SA.
